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## Preparing a Home to be Photographed

Below you'll find a checklist of items that will help you to prepare your home for photo day. Use your Realtor's advice, in conjunction with this checklist, to help make a good first impression of your home.

	Lawn should be cut.	
	Leaves should be raked.	
	Landscaping should be trimmed.	
	Remove trash cans and recycling containers from view.	
	Remove vehicles from the driveway.	
	If a vehicle blocks the view of the home, park it elsewhere if possible.	
	Hide any items which do not add value to the photo, such as lawn and garden equip-	
	ment, storage trailers, trash, etc.	
	If you have a nice outdoor space like a patio or deck, set it up as if you'll be having	
	friends over for a visit. Add patio cushions, open umbrellas, position chairs symmetrically around a table	
	metrically around a table. Remove ash trays.	
	Remove political signs and flags.	
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Interior Tips		
In General		
	Remove all clutter.	
	Have carpets freshly vacuumed.	
	Make sure all flooring looks clean.	
	Remove evidence of pets, such as food bowls, litter boxes, pet toys and leashes.	
	Turn on all lights, and replace any bulbs that aren't working.	
	Have televisions and computer monitors turned off.	
	Make sure firearms are locked away in a safe.	
	If you have started packing, put all boxes in an area of the house that won't be pho-	
	tographed – typically the garage or an unfinished basement.	
Living Room		
	Have televisions turned off.	
	Keep items on coffee and end tables to a minimum.	
Dining Room/Area		
	Keep items on dining table to a minimum.	
	If you have a nice set of dishes, napkins, and silverware, set it up as if you'll be hav-	
	ing company.	

Interior Tips (continued)		
Kitchen		
	Remove items from counter tops, such as:	
	□ Dish drying rack.	
	□ Dish cleaning items (sponges, brushes, dish detergent, etc.).	
	□ Containers of food.	
	□ Cups, glasses, dishes.	
	Make sure all appliances are clean.	
	Replace a dirty dish towel with a clean, decorative one.	
	Remove all pictures/magnets/notes/etc. from the outside of the refrigerator.	
	Remove trash can.	
	Remove anything pet-related, such as food containers, food and water bowls.	
	If flooring is nice, or throw rugs are dirty, remove them.	
Bathrooms		
	Remove items from counter top. The only items that should stay include:	
	☐ Hand soap (bottle or bar). If using a bar of soap, put out a brand new one.	
	□ Decorative items, such as flowers and candles are ok.	
	Make sure mirror is clean.	
	Toilet seat must be down.	
	Remove toilet cleaning brush.	
	Remove plunger.	
	Remove cans of disinfectant spray.	
	Remove containers of flushable wipes.	
	If you have towels out, make sure they are clean and folded neatly.	
	If flooring is nice, or throw rugs are dirty, remove them.	
Bedrooms		
	Make sure the beds are made.	
	Remove all personal items (deodorant, jewelry, tissue boxes, etc.).	
	Hide all clothing if possible.	
	Remove trash cans.

	te typical home, exterior shots will take me about 15 minutes. Iterior shots, roughly an hour per 1,250 square feet. If doing a Matterport and/or	
floor	plan, the time will approximately double the time to shoot a property.	
	not move the following items, so it's up to the Occupant or Realtor to move them:	
•	cat litter boxes	
•	animal crates	
•	toiletries, such as toothbrushes, towels, makeup, medication	
•	toilet cleaning brushes	
•	plungers
